Auspice Capital Manager Commentary

The CI Auspice Alternative Diversified Corporate Class invests 100% of its assets into Auspice Diversified Trust, the Auspice flagship CTA with over 17 years of history. The below commentary is for Auspice Diversified Trust as provided by Auspice.

SUMMARY

Auspice Diversified Trust ("ADT") ended softer by 0.3% per Table 1. After a generally stronger month, with gains in both short and long positions, and performance in energies and equities, risk management was warranted given the erratic responses of markets to erratic tariff announcements. ADT performed inline with sector benchmarks; the SG CTA Index gained 0.2% while the BTOP50 declined an estimated 0.8%.

Global equity markets largely ignored both geopolitical tensions and a flurry of threats and counter threats (although the early hours of August look decidedly weaker). While European markets remained subdued as tariff unknowns abounded, North American and Asian markets were strong. In the US the S&P500 gained 2.2% and the Nasdaq added 3.7%, while Canada's TSX60 gained a similar 1.4% alongside the global benchmark MSCI ACWI. Hong Kong's Hang Seng outperformed adding 2.9% as the China FTSE A50 gained 1.8%.

Commodity benchmarks were up most of July before abrupt corrections as we drew towards the looming August 1st US/Trump global tariff deadline. CME Copper, for example, dropped over 20% in a single day. By month end, many markets within sectors had disparate results with both gains and losses in Metals, Grains and Softs. As such, the more diverse Bloomberg Commodity Index (BCOM ER) corrected 0.8% while the energy tilted Goldman Sachs Commodity Index (GSCI ER) added 3.2% as petroleum energies held onto gains.

Both the US Fed and the Bank of Canada again elected to leaves rates unchanged and their powder dry to end July. Both central banks expressed concern over tariffs yet noted resilient economies to date and as a CI Global Asset Management economist noted "the central banks are in data dependent wait and see modes for the time being". As such, bonds softened slightly with the yield on the benchmark US 10-year Bond rising to 4.37% and close to levels not experienced since 2007.

The US year-over-year CPI again gained to 2.7% from 2.4% (for the June reading see Chart 2), as inflation concerns ramped up alongside tariff volatility further separating from the 2% target and more in line with the 100-year average of 3% and consumer realities. Per JP Morgan, the CPI gain "...reveals how tariffs are quietly reshaping consumer prices, particularly in sectors heavily reliant on imports"2.

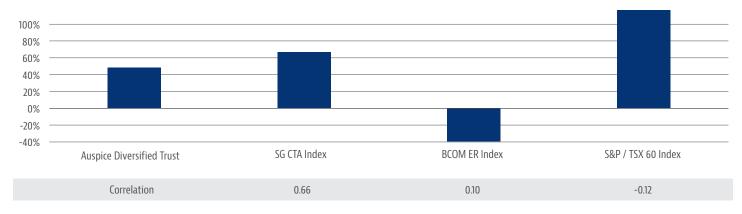
The US Dollar Index bounced from a 3-year low vis-à-vis most global currencies, gaining 3.3%, most notably the Yen falling 4.3% and the Euro losing 2.7%.

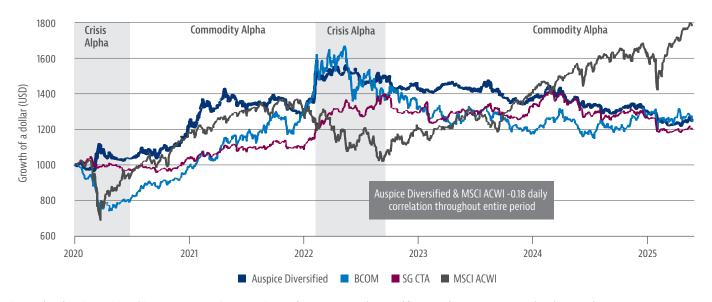
CUMULATIVE PERFORMANCE (SINCE JANUARY 15T 2007*)

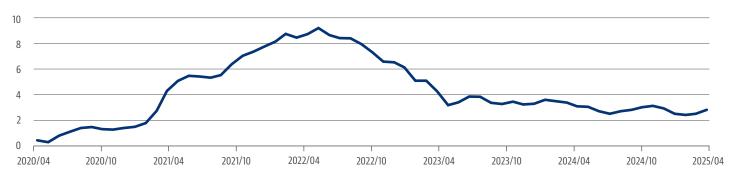

OUTLOOK

Commodities: Entering a New Phase of the Cycle

U.S. trade policy and energy demand are setting the stage for higher commodity prices. The average U.S. tariff rate is poised to rise to 15.2%, up from 13.3% and far above 2024's 2.3%³. At the same time, the Federal Reserve's preferred inflation gauge (core PCE) already accelerated in June at one of the fastest paces this year4.

Beneath the tariff headlines, structural supply shortages in metals are driving prices higher. The market has shifted from gold-led performance to broad supply-driven momentum, with platinum, palladium, silver, and iron ore making significant moves.

A key driver in renewed commodity momentum is the AI and data center boom, creating an unprecedented strain on energy and materials tied to electrification:

- The global cost to scale AI data centers could hit a staggering \$6.7 trillion by 2030⁵.
- · U.S. power consumption by data centers is on course to account for almost 50% of the growth in electricity demand between now and 20306.

· New data center construction could result in a nearly 20% increase in natural gas demand⁷.

These trends reinforce our view that the commodity cycle has resumed, fueled by inflation, supply constraints, and rising demand from energy-intensive technologies.

ATTRIBUTIONS AND TRADES

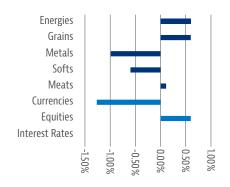
Per Chart 3, the portfolio result was mostly pulled down by late month reactions to tariffs in Metals and Currencies. Gains were made in Energies and Grains alongside Equities. As detailed below, both shorts and long exposures added value both across and within sub-sectors.

BY SECTOR

Energies: Last month's shift to long petroleum energies made gains alongside shorts in Natural Gas.

Grains: Sector performance came from net short exposure across numerous global markets.

Metals: Despite gains from long exposures in Silver and Palladium and short in Lead, the result was eclipsed by the sharp tariff induced correction in Copper.

Softs: Sector lost ground predominantly from a short in Orange Juice while short Robusta Coffee provided an offset.

Meats: Live Cattle gained 4.3% while Hogs corrected.

Currencies: Weakest of sector results as the bounce in the US Dollar led to numerous position changes, taking profits, reducing exposures and flipping to short in some cases. The Japanese Yen was the most significant pulling back 4.3% and moved to net short.

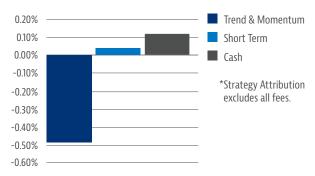
Equities: Gains from existing exposures alongside new positions in the Hang Seng and FTSE Taiwan.

Rates: Neutral result as bonds softened (higher rates) for slight gains in the long end (where long) offset by small losses in the short end (where short).

RETURN DRIVERS

Results were negative from trend-following strategies while offset by the non-correlated short-term (non-trend) strategies. We continue to earn on significant cash positions. See Chart 4.

- Shorts in Corn and Rough Rice down 2.8% and 7.9% respectively.
- Energies gained on the back of (WTI) Crude Oil up 6.1% and Natural Gas down 10.1%.
- Palladium added 9.0%

LOSSES

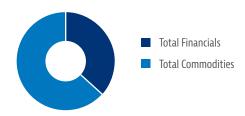
- Copper fell over 14%.
- Orange Juice rallied 15.5% against shorts (now covered).
- Currency corrections as the US Dollar rallied 3.3%.

EXPOSURE AND RISK ALLOCATION

Commodity to Financial exposure was slightly lower at 63:37 from 68:32, yet in line with the long-term average per Chart 5. The overall portfolio risk as measured by the Margin to Equity ratio, rose again to 10.1% from 8.4%, above the historical average level of 6.6% (see Chart 7 next page).

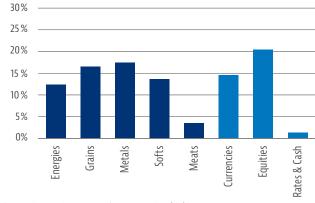
In Commodities, risk was decreased in Energies and Metals but increased back in Softs. Financial exposure was increased primarily in Equity Indices, See Chart 6.

CHART 5: COMMODITIES VS. FINANCIAL EXPOSURE



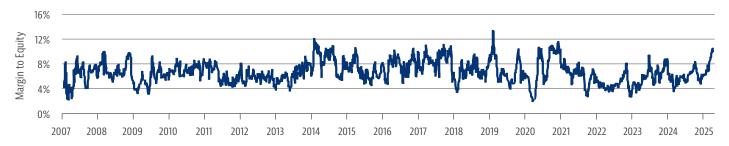

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Alpha is a measure of the active return on an investment, the performance of that investment compared with a suitable market index. An alpha of 1% means the investment's return on investment over a selected period of time was 1% better than the market during that same period.

Commodity Trading Advisors (CTAs) are professional investment managers, similar to portfolio managers in mutual funds, who seek to profit from movements in the global financial, commodity and currency markets by investing in exchange traded futures, options, and OTC forward contracts.

(PI) - The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change overtime in the prices paid by urban consumers for a market basket of consumer goods and services. It is often referenced as a measure of inflation.

Crisis alpha means that an investment strategy generates positive return in periods of high financial stress. For example, if a manager is short the market when it crashes, that manager will generate positive returns when other investors lose money.

Skew is the degree to which returns are asymmetric around the mean. Why does skew matter? If portfolio returns are right, or positively, skewed, it implies numerous small negative returns and a few large positive returns. If portfolio returns are left, or negatively, skewed, it implies numerous small positive returns and few large negative returns. Standard deviation is a measure of how much an investment's returns can vary from its average return. It is a measure of volatility and, in turn, risk.

Sortino Ratio measures the risk-adjusted return on a portfolio by comparing the performance relative to the downside deviation.

The DBIQ Diversified Agriculture Index Excess Return is a rules-based index composed of futures contracts on some of the most liquid and widely traded agricultural commodities.

The Margin to Equity ratio represents the amount of trading capital that is being held as margin at any particular time. For example, if a CTA fund with \$100 million AUM executes trades requiring \$25 million in margin, the margin-to-equity ratio is 25%.

The Sharpe ratio measures the performance of an investment such as a security or portfolio compared to a risk-free asset, after adjusting for its risk. It is defined as the difference between the returns of the investment and the risk-free return, divided by the standard deviation of the investment returns.

The UN Food and Agriculture World Food Price Index (FAO Food Price Index) is a food price index by the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations. It records the development of world market prices of 55 agricultural commodities and foodstuffs.

Value at risk (VaR) is a measure of the risk of loss for investments. It estimates how much a set of investments might lose (with a given probability), given normal market conditions, in a set time period such as a day.

Worst Drawdown measures the maximum fall in the value of the investment, as given by the difference between the value of the lowest trough and that of the highest peak before the trough.
